The field guide is written by forum members and provided for the larger hiking community as a free service.

- Maps can be obtained from forest service centers, REI and online.
- [Map Showing 2nd Meeting Locations](#) Click on a location pointer to get the address and standard meeting time. Use to determine which of our standard 2nd Meeting Locations best fits your chosen driving route.
- See our own spreadsheet [Mileage to Trailheads](#) for mileages to your chosen trailhead. If your trailhead is not listed here, there are online map tools that can be used to calculate driving mileage to your trailhead. Using Google Maps for instance, enter the trailhead location in the search box at the upper left corner of your screen in one of several possible ways:
  - By name - sometimes works for common locations ("Top Spur," "Dog Mountain")
  - By address - ("31195 SW Ladd Hill Rd, Sherwood, OR" for Magness Tree Farm)
  - By GPS coordinates - Coordinates for many trailheads can be found on [OregonHikers.org](#). Use the format: latitude, longitude.
  - Click the trailhead location on Google maps (enlarge map and trace known roads), right click and choose "Directions to here." The spot you click must be on

a road visible on the map.

Click the directions icon and enter our 1st meeting location in the “your location” line. For directions from WP, enter “Westlake Park” or “14165 Bunick Dr, Lake Oswego.” A recommended route in blue, and alternate routes in gray will be shown, giving driving distance (one-way) and expected travel time.

- Check out [hike stats](#) (including area, leader, distance & elevation gain, drive mileage, number of participants, etc.) on your chosen trail from when our group has done it previously. Search for a specific hike, or choose a listing by either date or hike name. Note that this may have been a different segment or route than the one you are proposing. Or a previous leader may have estimated distances and elevation. We now have more accurate online mapping tools.
